#### 6Rs

This half term's 6R focus is 'Resourcefulness':

- ✓ I know how to get help when I need it.
- ✓ I can ask different questions.
- ✓ I can choose what I need to complete a task.
- ✓ I have lots of my own ideas.
- ✓ I try to solve problems independently before asking for help.
- $\checkmark$  I am willing to learn and try new things.

#### Uniform

- ✓ Please ensure that the children are wearing their black school <u>shoes</u> as many children are wearing trainers.
- ✓ Earrings should only be plain studs and not hoops or other designs.
- ✓ Headbands should be plain and simple and not brightly coloured or embellished.
- Please label every piece of clothing with your child's name and check the uniform at home belongs to your child. There are quite a few lost items.

#### **Parents' Meetings**

This term's Parents' Meetings will take place on Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> March. The meetings will take place between 3.45pm and 7.30pm. This should allow some parents to meet the teacher after school and some to have an appointment after work. The appointments include an opportunity to look at some of the children's work as well as a short meeting with the teacher, which will include a discussion about your child's academic progress, behaviour and attitude towards their learning. Many parents have been making use of the longer Thursday appointments and may well not require a further formal meeting at this time. As usual, if you require more time, arrangements can be made with the class teachers following the Parents' Meeting. Children are not required to attend. Families with children in several year groups will be accommodated, so that your appointments allow time to meet each teacher. Every child will be allocated an appointment. We look forward to seeing you there!

Parents are also welcome to contact the class teacher any time to discuss any issues.



# We need your help...

Rushen Primary School has significantly increased in size over the last year and a half and this year we have almost 300 pupils. As a result, the administration arrangements have increased. Mrs Awkal will not always be based in the office, so please send a note to the class teacher if your child needs to attend a medical appointment. Requests for authorised absences should be addressed to the Headteacher and sent in a labelled envelope to the class teacher with your child.

# Dinner Money

Please help us to manage the dinner money arrangements. It is becoming increasingly difficult for Mrs Aukal to manage the dinner money on a one to one basis. You can help by:

- ✓ Paying, by cash or cheque, in advance (as instructed by the IOM Government).
- ✓ Keeping an ongoing total so that you are aware of what you owe.
- ✓ All monies must be put in a labelled envelope and sent to class with your child, to be handed to their teacher. In an emergency, please place in the black post box to the left of the office window.

# Answer Machine Messages

In order to manage the large number of telephone calls, please leave a message on the answer machine. I want to assure you that if the telephone goes to answer machine, these are listened to and considered as necessary. To help us understand the messages please remember the following:

- ✓ Speak clearly-sometimes messages are very muffled and difficult to hear.
- ✓ Tell us your child's full name and class.
- ✓ Tell us why they are off school.
- ✓ Keep the message brief and to the point.

# <u>Readiness</u>

- ✓ Please encourage your child's independence by asking them to prepare their school equipment the night before with you.
- ✓ If your child forgets their kit/equipment etc., it may not be possible to pass it on during the day.

# Absence, notes, money,

✓ Please ensure that all written communication to the school such as notes regarding absence, messages, requests and trip money, is placed in a sealed envelope and labelled with the child's full name, class, and the title of the contents.

### School Improvement Update

Following on from my newsletter last year regarding school improvement, the staff have been continuing to reflect and review routines, practices and policies. School improvement happens in a continuous cycle where we identify areas for improvement, plan actions, implement and review to consider impact.

Our vision at Rushen Primary School is focused on building positive relationships, having high expectations of behaviour and learning, and of achieving high standards and good progress for every child. The staff are committed to the process and have worked hard to achieve improvement.

So far this academic year we have met with our School Link Adviser from the Department of Education, Sport and Culture to share our work on Teaching for Learning and we are currently looking at Leadership and Management in preparation for her next visit. As a result of the hard work of all staff, we are proud that the school has continued to be recognised as being on track and effective in its efforts to raise standards.

All staff have the opportunity to contribute to school leadership - 'everyone a leader' and staff are encouraged and supported in this, making good use of individual interests, specialisms, knowledge and experience. We also encourage the children to take leadership roles through, for example, School Council, Buddies, volunteering to lead clubs, representing the school in a range of events, leadership opportunities and responsibilities in class and suggesting ideas for improvement in a range of areas including learning.

Our teachers continue to build positive relationships with the parents of the children in their class and other classes and use various methods of communication. Please support them in this role by arranging meetings when you have questions or concerns about your own child, or a quick and less formal 'chat' at the end of the school day. Our Middle Leadership Team and Senior Leaders are always on hand to support our teachers and other staff.

We continue to focus on improving behaviour for learning and the development of personal and social skills. A change in the way we manage behaviour has had a significant impact in our school, supporting the children with their learning and progress. We have focused on building positive relationships and have been using an approach based on restorative practice where the concept of 'conferencing' is the main focus. When an issue arises we talk it through and when children are calm and ready, we undertake conferences. This allows each person to talk about how they felt, how they feel now, the impact of their actions on others and what they will do to make things right. Sometimes the children need help to reflect on what has happened and they have the opportunity to 'think and fix'. This moves away from the concept of punishment. We are focusing on learning at all times. When children are focused on their own learning and next steps, this reduces the need for rewards as a method of securing appropriate behaviour and instead rewards learning.

We continue to focus on developing a 'growth mindset culture'. We do this through our work on the 6Rs and Learning Muscles that the children use to support them with their learning, how to be a good learner and in their day-to-day learning. You could help at home by asking questions about the learning, such as "What did you learn today?" rather than "What did you do today?". This shift in emphasis is crucial in encouraging children to take responsibility for their own learning and next steps which can be applied to any learning.



### **Dinner Money**

The cost of school dinners is £67.50 until the Easter holidays. Dinner money is payable to the Isle of Man Government and must be paid for in advance. It is the responsibility of the Isle of Man Government to audit the payments, so that the correct number of meals is provided. The school does not have the authority to provide any meals that are not paid for in advance. Any existing outstanding payments will now be passed to the Isle of Man Government for collection. ## **Events/Visitors**

#### **EYFS**

Our Early Years staff have been working with our pre-school feeder schools since the start of this school year, in order to learn about the children who will be attending Rushen Primary School in September 2019. Our Early Years staff have been involved with getting to know the children by visiting them at their pre-school setting. We will be welcoming different groups of pre-school children and staff to stay and play with our Reception pupils. These visits will take place during the summer term, when parents will also be invited. Each year this has had a positive impact on the transition process and children, parents and staff have found this an invaluable experience.

This year, World Book Day is on 7th March. I know that this event has been well supported over the years by parents at Rushen Primary School and we look forward to seeing the children in their costumes. Please choose a character from a children's book to dress up as and bring the book to school!
