

# Healthy Streets design competition

#### **Guillemot Class Christmas crafts**

We made Christmas decorations out of lolly pop sticks. We recycled them to save them from going in the bin. We thought carefully about colours and design before making our festive decorations. We worked hard and used our keeping going muscle. We all loved making them!

We also made a calendar from a design that looks like we are floating through the sky, being carried by balloons. There were lots of steps to make it and we had to use our planning and absorbing muscles. We blended colours to make the sky, we layered materials for the skyline and balloons, and we had to pose for our picture. We enjoyed making them, even though some bits were kind of hard. We will enjoy looking at them all year.





For our Christmas card design this year we made a Christmas tree for the front of the card. We used crayons and water colour paints for the tree design. Making the tree was quite tricky because we had to cut strips of paper and weave them together, before cutting our final tree shape from our woven strips. We used our keeping going muscle and the weaving got easier as we went on. We've never made a woven tree before and we really liked doing it. We hope our families will like them too!

Dear Parents/Carers,

I am writing to let you know that a large section of the school roof will be replaced during next half term (January and February), weather and situation permitting. This is to ensure that the nesting birds which delayed the previous plans, are not present. If you recall, the centre section could go ahead because there were no birds nesting there, as the roof is different to the roof on either end of the building.

The Phase B section (see the photograph below) of the KS2 building will be re-roofed. This will mean that a site office, scaffolding, building equipment and materials will be on the school site. The work area will be fenced off. It is hopeful that less space will be taken up this time, as some materials may be stored near the entrance to the school site on Church Road and in the staff car park near the school office.

It is important that nobody accesses the fenced off areas or the site office and that safety is our top priority.

The plans mean that access past the KS2 classrooms around the outside of the school will not be possible and that some classes will not be able to use the doors out onto the front field, except in the event of an emergency evacuation.

While the scaffolding is up, the following arrangements will be in place:

- Shearwater Class will be able to use their outside doors and children can be collected as usual
- Sandpiper Class will leave by the KS2 door onto the main playground at the end of the school day
- Swift Class will leave by the KS2 door onto the main playground at the end of the school day
- Guillemot Class will leave by the KS2 door onto the main playground at the end of the school day

Bicycles and scooters should be placed at the opposite end of the school building to where they are stored now, around the corner from Room 13, Peregrine Class door. Bicycles and scooters should be placed neatly and carefully to avoid blocking the path. Please remember, bicycles/scooters must not be ridden in the carparks or playground.



Please walk on the public footpath/pavement outside the school boundary that borders the front field, to the entrance past the lower car park on Castletown Road.

- The field is muddy at the moment so please ensure pupils use the public footpath outside of the school boundary
- ALL FIRE EXIT DOORS FROM THE CLASSROOMS AFFECTED WILL BE ABLE TO BE USED IN AN EMERGENCY

On the school week beginning Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> January (first day back after the Christmas break), equipment and materials will be delivered to school and put in place and scaffolding will be installed. As you can see from the plans, a section of the lower car park will be used and full access will be required during the day between the hours of 9am and 3pm and then from 3.45pm until close of the day (the work may continue into the evening when required). Parents will still be able to use the remaining space in the car park for drop offs in the morning and after school. We thank you for your patience.

Sections of the staff car park at the front of the building will also be used and the disabled parking bays may also be out of use. If you are a disabled badge holder please park elsewhere in the car park.

The work will continue for the half term although weather may cause delays. All building work is subject to change.

Please see photographs of the plans from the roofing contractor, at the end of this letter.

I thank you in advance for your support and encourage you to speak to your child about safety on site when building work is underway. We will also talk about this with the children. Please be aware if your child accesses the school site in the evenings or at weekends unsupervised, that you have spoken to them about keeping safe.
