<p>Speaking and Listening I can recite a poem using my voice effectively</p> <p>Watch this clip for advice on how to use your voice when reading poetry. Read aloud the first verse of 'The Adventures of Isabel' following the tips. Make sure you use a scary voice for the bear!</p>	<p>Bar charts I can investigate different methods of displaying data</p> <p>Watch this clip to remind yourself how data can be collected and displayed. Use this activity to practise gathering discrete data in tables, bar charts and pictograms.</p>	<p>Science I can talk about friction as a force</p> <p>Watch this clip about friction. Try rolling a ball or a sliding a toy car along different surfaces in your home. Do some surfaces create more friction than others? What do you notice about those surfaces? This clip might help you to think about how to gather the information fairly. For a challenge, present your findings in a bar chart.</p>
<p>Reading I can identify examples of words or literary features chosen by the author to create a desired effect.</p> <p>Listen to the clip by poet Joseph Coelho. Can you find any of the features he says poets use in 'The Adventures of Isabel'?</p>	<p>Reading bar charts I can present my own discrete data</p> <p>Carry out your own survey among your family using a table to collect the data. Present your data using a bar chart or pictogram. It could be about their favourite fruit, chocolate bar or film to watch. Make sure you pick about 5 options for them to choose from first. How will you record it if they don't like any of your options?</p>	<p>Physical I can hold positions with control</p> <p>Using items from around the house, try to balance them on all parts of your body! Create your own workout: can you use objects from around your house to create your own workout?</p>
<p>Writing I can use features of a chosen style appropriately and consistently</p> <p>Listen to or read the rest of 'The Adventures of Isabel' and write your own verse, detailing what Isabel got up to next. Make sure you follow the pattern that Ogden Nash used when you write your verse.</p>	<p>Interpreting bar charts I can interpret data from a bar chart</p> <p>Watch this clip which explains how you can use bar charts to answer questions about data. Now play this game. There are three different levels to choose from; try to challenge yourself!</p>	<p>ICT I can identify databases and their uses</p> <p>Visit this website to learn about databases and how they are used in real life.</p>
<p>Word, sentence, grammar I can use adverbs accurately</p> <p>Watch this for a reminder about how to use adverbs. Write some sentences about Isabel's adventures using adverbs, for example, Isabel courageously ate the bear. Ask a family member if they can spot which word is the adverb.</p>	<p>Line graphs I can interpret line graphs</p> <p>Watch this clip, which will tell you about line graphs and when we use them. Now, see if you can answer the questions about the puppy's growth on this worksheet.</p>	<p>Creative I can experiment with colour, pattern, shape to create different effects to suit the purpose of my work.</p> <p>Watch these clips to remind yourself of some of the animals that live in different habitats. Now create a habitat diorama to show where your favourite animal lives.</p>
<p>Spelling I can spell plural nouns accurately.</p> <p>Last week, you learned the rules for spelling plural nouns. Make a poster that explains those rules clearly for younger children to use.</p>	<p>Problem solving I can solve problems about data by thinking logically</p> <p>Can you use what you know about data handling to solve problems? Have a go at solving this problem. You will need to read the chart carefully to solve it!</p>	<p>Just For Fun</p> <p>Learn how to play some card games with your family.</p>
